11/22/63 is a different genre than most Stephen King books and while some of us missed the "spooky" aspect that he is known for, it was still really enjoyable. We think this book is a great introduction for people who have never read Stephen King, and that old fans of King will love the interwoven stories from his other books. We'd also urge people to remember that Stephen King's books are about the journey... not necessarily the ending.

It is a novel of rich vs poor, old vs new, and parents vs children.

The retelling of Jesus' story with focus on his childhood and teenage years fit within the Bible as it is, and brought in some new ideas about how Jesus came to be, as well as framing the story within a historical narrative. We found the story seemed to be split into three main parts - the beginning and development of friendship between Joshua and Biff, the middle and exploration of Joshua as he tries to discover what being the Messiah means, and the end. Our favourite parts were the beginning and middle - we found the end left something to be desired, not because of the loss of Joshua, but in the resolution of Biff's story.

We think this was a great read and had some touching moments, good chuckles, and a new and relatable perspective on the Bible. This book would be best enjoyed by mature audiences (it's definitely not for kids, but requires a sense of humour!) and those who are open-minded to new theories about religion. We gave this a rating of 3.5/5.
